## Congressman Tom Lantos

The morning of February 11, 2008 began with the somber details as I heard over the morning news regarding the passing of Congressman Tom Lantos. The OCA San Mateo Chapter deeply feels saddened by the loss of a friend who was a staunch supporter and will truly be missed. He made the point to take time from his busy schedule to support OCA.

Last year, during our Achievement Awards gala, he shared his passion for Asian Pacific Americans with an eloquent speech. His presence was with dignity and grace. Another example of his commitment to the Asian community occurred as he offered to place a college intern to gain experience in his office during the summer. He also made it a practice to have a Chinese American staff person in his office which our chapter had a positive connection with. Jaynry Mak is currently that representative who is a pleasure to work with.

We all know about his humble beginnings and that he was a holocaust survivor who struggled to achieve his goal to serve in Congress. A remarkable story of courage that referred to himself as "an American by choice" provided an example of a role model to the community. Prior to his service in Congress, for three decades Tom Lantos was an economics professor, an international affairs analyst for television, a consultant to businesses, and served as a senior advisor to U. S. Senators.

Mr. Lantos was a well-known supporter of the environment. He was a Democrat member of the House of Representatives from 1981 until his death. He represented California's 12 congressional districts which included part of San Francisco and San Mateo counties, shared last month that he would not seek re-election due to esophageal cancer. He devoted his political career to speaking out human rights issues. He spoke out for Tibetans to be able to keep their culture and religion in Tibet and fought for Christians who wish to practice their faith in Saudi Arabia and Sudan.

His 27 year distinguished career in Congress, he had become chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. Issues that he fought for included, in 2006 protesting the Sudanese government's role of carrying out genocide in the Darfur conflict, critical comments about the War in Iraq, and his stand to block a foreign aid package by President George W. Bush to Lebanon unless Beirut agreed to deploy international troops on the border with Syria.

We had a special treat as Gerrye Wong and Carol Fong, of the Chinese Historical & Cultural Project Santa Clara County. The Chinese Historical and Cultural Project (CHCP) is based in Santa Clara County, California. Founded in 1987, as a non-profit organization to promote and preserve Chinese American and Chinese history and culture through community outreach activities.

Ms. Wong presented and shared her book, "Chinese in San Jose and the Santa Clara Valley." and then we viewed a DVD. Chinese immigrants were seeking opportunity, but they encountered unforeseen struggles. During 1866 to 1931, there were five Chinatowns in San Jose, each one destroyed by fires or unfair laws. Early Chinese in the region persevered at building railroads and levees and labored as laundrymen, cooks, grocers, field hands, factory workers, and servants.
