# 1999 OCA Scholarship Award Recipients Announced at Banquet by Alden Soohoo

On May 15, 1999, The Organization of Chinese Americans - San Mateo County Chapter held its Annual Scholarship Banquet at the Sheraton Gateway in Burlingame.

Dr. Alden Soohoo, Chairman of the OCA Scholarship Committee, proudly announced the 1999 winners. Eight scholarship recipients were honored at the banquet. The eight winners were selected from 67 applicants representing the 22 high schools of San Mateo County.

### **Hate Crimes Legislation Update**

### **Current Legislation**

OCAis supporting the Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 1998, which would make it easier for federal prosecution to become involved in hate climes (currently defined as willfully causing bodily injury because of the victim's actual or perceived race, color, religion or national origin) where state law is insufficient. At present, a federal official who wishes to prosecute a hate crime must prove the victim was involved in a federally-protected activity; this bill would remove this unnecessary obstacle. The bill would also expand the list of protected peoples to include those attacked because of their gender, sexual orientation, or disability.

The Senate bill (S. 1529), sponsored by Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA) was introduced in November last year and has been referred to the committee on Judiciary while its House counterpart (H.R. 3081), sponsored by Representatives Charles Schumer (D-NY) and Bill McCollum (R-FL) and introduced on the same day, has been referred to four committees. Senate hearings on the bill were held on July 8, and displayed strong bipartisan support for the act.

U.S. v. Machado

On February 11, 1998, 21-year-old Richard Machado of Los Angeles was found guilty on two counts of civil rights law violations, the first ever conviction for a hate crime committed over the Internet. This historic indictment follows an earlier

acquittal verdict. Machado resented Asian Americans at the University of California at Irvine, where he had flunked out earlier, for their contribution to a "lack of campus quality" and, as the government charged, because of their academic status. Although he was no longer a student at the University, he had managed to log on to his account and send an e-mail message to 59 students with Asian-sounding last names saying he would "personally make it my life career to find and kill every one of you personally." Because UC Irvine is a public institution and race was an element in his threat, the case fell under federal civil rights statute. In May, he received a sentence of time already served (a total of fifteen months), no fine, and no ban from Internet access as the government had requested.

OCA considers these cases representative of the lingering resentment in the country that Asian Americas are foreign intruders plundering resources that rightfully belong to the "true Americans" - and that they are the ones to blame whenever any type of hardship arrives, whether it be economic, academic, or political. From the Chinese Exclusion Act - the first ever immigration act directed at a racial minority - to the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II, to the present day, Asian Americans have been scapegoated, stereotyped, and help to the whim of volatile political majorities. This pattern must come to a stop, and OCA will continue to mobilize support in order to stop it.
