# OCA, Yee Oppose LPGA Policy: LPGA Backs Off

Under intense pressure from organizations like OCA and State Senator Leland Yee, the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) rescinded its new policy requiring foreign players to be proficient in English or be suspended from the LPGA tournaments. OCA and other Asian American organizations had criticized the LPGA policy and State Senator Leland Yee threatened to protest at the LPGA's upcoming tournament at Half Moon Bay.

San Mateo Chapter President Newsy Yan found the LPGA position distasteful, saying "Sportsmanship is not about race, nor language. For the LPGA to require the language skill to single out one race is not what we stand for as an Asian American."

The policy by the LPGA got a lot of press, and many of the LPGA's members, including many Asian members, were in favor of the policy, according to news reports.

Senator Yee and his Democratic colleagues in the Senate sent a letter to LPGA Chief Executive Carolyn Bivens blasting the policy. "Mandating English on the LPGA Tour will disenfranchise qualified players from the global community of professional golf," said Yee. "English fluency has no bearing on an athlete's ability to compete. Denying access based on language capability or country of origin is unfair, unreasonable, and discriminatory."

The LPGA claimed that it is important for players to be able to interact with American media, despite there being no relevance to the sport. No other professional sports league in the United States requires such a mandate. There are 121 international golfers on the LPGA Tour, coming from 26 different countries. Many of the foreign players are from Korea.

The LPGA is scheduled to hold the Samsung World Championship at Half Moon Bay Golf Links, which is in Yee's Senate district, from October 2 to October 5. Yee planned to join protestors in picketing the event until the LPGA changed its policy.

After over 50 organizations joined forces to oppose a discriminatory policy by the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA), the Tour announced today they would back off plans to suspend players who could not efficiently speak English.

## Students to participate in record numbers in democracy LIVE! Program

Schools throughout the Peninsula have sprung into action in response to the San Mateo County's call for student poll workers for the upcoming November 4 election. 20 high schools are supporting San Mateo County's student poll worker program and have been asked to encourage students to apply for the program.

San Mateo County Chief Elections Officer Warren Slocum has said, "This program creates a unique opportunity for students to participate in our democracy, witness the participation of voters in their own community, and provide critical service to voters at the polls." Student poll workers must be U.S. citizens, be a resident or student in San Mateo County, be 16 years of age, hold a 2.5 g.p.a., and have the permission of their parents(or guardians) and teachers.

Student poll workers are critical members of the Election Day team, and provide support to Elections staff by assisting voters and managing polling place operations. Students participating in democracyLIVE! are paid \$125. Training is mandatory and are held at school sites. Students may receive up to 20 community service hours to apply toward graduation requirements. To learn more about the democracyLIVE! program, please visit the democracyLIVE! # LPGA Rescinds Language Policy continued from page 1

One major sponsor, State Farm, had announced it would no longer support the LPGA if it did not rescind its new policy. "The LPGA has received valuable feedback from a variety of constituents regarding the recently announced penalties attached to our effective communications policy," said LPGA Commissioner Carolyn Bivens. "We have decided to rescind those penalty provisions. After hearing the concerns, we believe there are other ways to achieve our shared objective of supporting and enhancing the business opportunities for every Tour player. In that spirit, we will continue communicating with our diverse Tour players to develop a better alternative. The LPGA will announce a revised approach, absent playing penalties, by the end of 2008."

OCA's national leaders, including Executive Director Michael Lin and National OCA President Ginny Gong, also criticized the policy. "One does not need to speak English in order to play professional sports in this country," said Ginny Gong. "We play sports to unify groups, not to divide. This would suggest that someone like Lance Armstrong needs to be proficient in French in order to participate in the Tour de France."

## Event

On September 18, David Chai, Ph.D., a board member and officer of our San Mateo County Chapter, gave a presentation on the Chinese Sequence Code, An Innovative Solution for Sorting and Indexing. David, who is retired and formerly with Bell Labs / Bellcore, made the presentation about unlike alphabet-based languages. Chinese ideographs do not have a "natural" sorting sequence. The 16-bit internal codes that are currently used in computers are essentially randomly assigned. As a consequence, one cannot sort Chinese text, such as names in a column of a spreadsheet, nor produce a sorted index of a book written in Chinese. The Chinese Sequence Code (CSC) provides an algorithm that maps every Chinese character that is internally represented by a standard 16-bit GB code [for simplified Chinese], Big5 code [for traditional Chinese] or Unicode [an international standard for multiple languages, including simplified and traditional Chinese] into a unique alphabetic sequence using the 26
