Judy Yung Shows Us the Real Chinatown

OCA co-sponsored with the Asian American Curriculum Project, Inc. and the San Mateo Public Library on Nov. 14th, author and historian Judy

Yung's slide talk on the new pictorial history book. Images of America: San Francisco's Chinatown. co-authored with the Chinese Historical Society of America. Spanning over 150 years of history, the book reveals how a place visitors see as foreign and exotic is, in fact, a

vibrant Chinese American neighborhood with a complex history and rich cultural legacy.

This collection of 200 vintage photographs looks beyond the facade of Chinatown to show the realities of daily life, including a community's struggle for survival against racial hostility, exclusion laws, two major earthquakes, and redevelopment. The images of ordinary people working, shopping, and socializing in Chinatown, combined with the changing streetscape, historic landmarks, and significant cultural and political events, are organized into three historical periods, providing a panoramic view of community transformation from the gold rush to the present day.

Judy Yung is a second-generation Chinese American born and raised in San Francisco Chinatown. She received her B.A. in English Literature and Chinese Language from San Francisco State University and her Master's in Library Science and Ph.D. in Ethnic Studies from University of California, Berkeley. Dr. Yung worked as a librarian, journalist, and director of two book projects on Asian American women before becoming Professor of American Studies at the University of California, Santa Cruz, where she taught courses in Asian American studies, women's history, oral history, and mixed race.

Her publications include: Island: Poetry and History of Chinese Immigrants on Angel Island, 1910-1940; the critically acclaimed Unbound Feet: A Social History of Chinese Women in San Francisco; Unbound Voices: A Documentary History of Chinese Women in San Francisco; and most recently, Chinese American Voices: From the Gold Rush to the Present. Her husband's memoirs, The Adventures of Eddie Fung: Chinatown Kid, Texas Cowboy, and POW Survivor, will be published next year. She is currently working on a narrative history of Pacific immigration through Angel Island.

2006 Elections Change San Mateo County

The 2006 elections--both the primary election in June and the November general election--changed the politicd and community of San Mateo County. The elections of Leland Yee, Fiona Ma and Rod Hsiao signaled the next big step in the Chinese and Asian community's development here.

Leland Yee's election to the State Senate, replacing Jackie Speier who was termed out, showed that a Chinese American candidate could win a major heated election in San Mateo County in which he took on much of the County's political organizations. For example, none of the five County supervisors endorsed Leland Yee's candidacy. Also, Mike Nevin captured many of the non-Asian endorsements. Leland Yee is, to my knowledge, the first State elected official in San Mateo County. Most of the political watchers in the County anticipate that this will change County politics in a major way. Yee put together an impressive political organization, raised a considerable amount of money, and waged a major campaign that covered most of the County. What is important is also that Yee gathered a significant number of non-Asian votes showing an Asian candidate could cross over ethnic lines.

Fiona Ma's win in Leland Yee's seat in the State Assembly puts two Chinese Americans in the State legislature representing parts of San Mateo County. Although her seat covers only parts of the North County, such as Daly City and Brisbane, this is where Leland Yee entered State politics and then jumped to the Senate. Ma is ambitious, as is Yee, and most believe that these seats are not--when they finish--the end of either.

Rod Hsiao represents, to my recollection, the first Chinese American candidate to win a seat in a County-wide election since the late Frank Lee won reelection to the Harbor Commission in the 1990s. Hsiao, Yee and Ma all take serious issue with school and education issues which are most dear to Chinese American families--as well as all families.

Several other Chinese and Asian candidates also ran in this election but did not win. Virginia Chang Kiraly, a Republican candidate, took on incumbent Ira Ruskin but lost. Fel Amistad, a Filipino American, ran against Rod Hsiao. And Jeffrey Tong ran for County School Board from South San Francisco but did not make it. These elections, win or lose, signal more political activity among the many Chinese and Asians who live in this County. Clearly there still exists a huge dearth in the number and percentage of elected supervisors, city council members and school board members in the County and 20 incorporated cities in

San Mateo County. Even non-Asian elected officials throughout the County agree that our community is under-represented here. (*These are not the views of OCA but those of the writer.*)

Speak and Lead with Pride

t was two years ago that OCA-San Mateo initiated a program called "Speak and Lead with Pride".

The purpose was to provide our high schoolers an opportunity to learn the art of public speaking, thereby developing her/his leadership potential. We sent out notices for this program to the guidance counselors of all the San Mateo high schools to ask them to recommend high-achieving students. Since it is held over eight weekends, each time for one and half hours, it attracts only those who are dedicated to learn new lifetime skills. This time we have six high school students, from freshman to senior, all from the Mills high school in Millbrae.

The program covers a number of topics centering on preparing and delivering a speech. Such topics as knowing the subject matter, the occasion, the audience and their expectations are first covered. Then preparation of the speech with a beginning, a middle and a conclusion section with a variety of techniques, including transitioning and audio & visual aids, are discussed. Finally, the preparation for delivery with some stress-relieving techniques, voice control, eye contacts, body posture and hand movements are demonstrated. Most importantly, each week, the students are given subject matter to choose and prepare for a few minutes of actual delivery in front of the class to be critiqued by her/his classmates as well as the instructor. The learning comes from continued practice and feedback. In addition, we invite a quest speaker who has excellent public speaking skills for them to listen and to ask intelligent questions. There is a final competition for the best speech delivery with a cash prize.

The program was originally designed and offered two years ago by Board member William Kwong. He was assisted by Cary Chen when it was offered for the second time. This time, Board member David Chai is leading the program, with assistance from both William Kwong and Cary Chen. If continued demand is there, we would like to make this a regular yearly program.

Second Harvest Food Sort

he Second Harvest Food Bank provides food to 670 nonprofit agencies and distribution sites. The agencies include childcare, homeless shelters, pantries, soup kitchens, and senior nutrition centers. The food bank provides food to hungry people throughout the Bay Area. The Food Bank distributes food to those of limited income by collecting surplus food from bakers, grocers,

growers, manufacturers. and packers. They are a private nonprofit organization whose goal is to collect and distribute approximately 27 million pounds of food every vear to lowincome children. adults, and

seniors. The Food Bank serves an average of 163,500 individuals each month including 60% are families with dependent children. Their Mission is to provide food for those people in need in our community.

The food donated to Second Harvest needs to prepared for distribution, whether it is sorted or repacked. Volunteers are important to help prepare 26 million pounds of food to be distributed to an average of 143,000 people in each month. What a simple and easy way to give back to those that are in the need of help. It was a rewarding experience to take time to benefit others in our community. Contributions from volunteers help provide food to the hungry in the counties, which Second Harvest Food Bank serves. OCA members from the San Mateo County Chapter participated at the San Carlos warehouse site. Our project activity included packing various mixed canned and packaged goods in boxes for the needy. Everyone was productive and the time went by quickly.

OCA DEDICATES NEW HEADQUARTERS IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Jan. 14, 2007--Another historic chapter in the annals of OCA was made today with the dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony of the new OCA National Center for Asian Pacific American Leadership. OCA National President Ginny Gong formally dedicated the building that also become OCA's permanent headquarters in the nation's capital. The over 300 attendees included dignitaries such as Former U.S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta, Congressman David Wu, Congresswoman Mazie Hirono, Congressman Albert Wynn, U.S. Department of Labor Chief Financial Officer Sam Mok (representing U.S. Secretary of Labor Elaine Chao), OCA Founders Kung-Lee Wang and Alex Mark, corporate partners, colleagues, community friends, leaders and members from across the nation. The ribbon cutting ceremony and reception at the new Center located in Dupont Circle followed the formal dedication held at the National Broadcasters Association.

"For more than three decades, OCA has continually demonstrated its leadership at the local and national levels. We have been a passionate voice for Asian Americans throughout the nation and visionary in our efforts to facilitate the gathering of hearts and minds. Once again, we had set our sights on a new horizon and have succeeded," she added.

OCA National Center Campaign Chair and OCA Past National President Claudine Cheng remarked, "With the establishment of the OCA National Center for Asian Pacific American Leadership, OCA is reaffirming to Asian Pacific Americans nationwide, our commitment to advancing the interests of the community at the national level. On behalf of the fundraising campaign committee, I thank the OCA chapters and all the contributors from around the country whose support has made it possible for OCA to acquire a permanent presence in Washington, DC. This has truly been a grassroots campaign in the spirit of leaving a legacy for future generations and for the betterment of the entire community.

During the dedication, a special announcement was made by Leslie Moe-Kaiser. State Farm's Corporate Relations Manager for Asian and Pacific Islander American Communities. State Farm announced its decision to award OCA with a \$500,000 grant for education programs in the areas of financial literacy for families and business development for entrepreneurs hosted at the OCA National Center. Special guest and Former U.S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta thanked OCA founders Kung-Lee Wang and Alex Mark for leading the way.

OCA Takes Issue with Rosie O'Donnell's Mocking of Chinese

OCA, a national Asian Pacific American organization dedicated to ensuring social justice for APAs, questions the tone and intent of Rosie O'Donnell's apology for comments made on "The View" on December 5th, and its implications on the Asian Pacific American population.

O'Donnell apologized during the December 14th episode of her show, "The View," after public outcry by the APA community over her mocking of Chinese newscasters. "You know, it was never [my] intent to mock, she said, "and I'm sorry for those people who felt hurt or were teased on the playground." She further went on to characterize her accent as "Chinese, Asian, pseudo-Japanese, sounded a little Yiddish ..." In her comments, O'Donnell mocked Chinese people and the Chinese language.

"I am very concerned about the tone and intent of Ms. O'Donnell's so called 'apology,'" said OCA National President Ginny Gong. "I don't believe she fully realizes the seriousness of what she did in front of millions of Americans and the impact it has on our community. Jokes used by comics should not be at the expense of an entire population of people. As a very public figure, she is an influential role model and should lead by example," she added.

"OCA would never condone the mocking of any language in this manner and tone," commented Michael Lin, OCA Executive Director. "O'Donnell does not show the respect that all Americans are entitled to, nor do we think she realizes how this type of language can manipulate itself into much more serious and potentially violent acts. We will be calling on our chapters and affiliates to proactively educate our community and the community-at-large to ensure that such incidents are not repeated."

One of the basic points of the OCA/Allstate Hate Crime Education and Prevention program is that deceptively simple acts and comments are the root and catalyst of hate crimes and bias incidents.

O'Donnell and many others may not have considered her comments racist and only intended in jest.

However, these comments when left unaddressed, can lead to much more serious incidents and crimes
