Franklin M. Kang delivered the eulogy on behalf of the OCA San Mateo at Newsy Yan's December 29, 2009 service at the San Bruno Chinese Church.

I come to you in my capacity as a past President of OCA San Mateo. I had the privilege of serving with Newsy on the Board of Directors; Newsy served as a Board member when I served as President, and I served on the Board under her leadership thereafter.

When we heard of Newsy's death within OCA, we were heartbroken. In response to the news of her passing, I received messages from around the nation, written by people Newsy touched over the years. We all knew Newsy in different ways, and I would like to share how I came to know her. To put it succinctly, Newsy lived by "guy rules[:]" private but warm; quiet but opinionated; humble but fiercely driven to succeed; never a

complainer and willing to serve when needed.

As a lawyer and a professional woman, Newsy was careful and reserved. But if you were fortunate enough to break through this tough exterior, you would find a warm, fun-loving girl, who enjoyed the gift of life. The letter from the former Executive Director of OCA Daphne Kwok that I will share captures one of these moments, as does the memory shared by my spouse Clarissa. I will also share portions of letters written by Karen and Conrad Lee, Bill HooFatt, Linda Ng, and Camilla Ng among others this morning.

To Mrs. Yan, you should know what a strong daughter you had in Newsy. As a Chinese born woman in a foreign land, working in a field traditionally dominated by men, Newsy displayed a degree of strength, courage, and warmth that would have filled your heart with pride on any day. As a fellow lawyer and the son of immigrants, I know how much she overcame since arriving in America.

We watched Newsy as she worked hard to succeed as a lawyer, while serving her community through OCA. We witnessed your daughter become a strong accomplished woman, and shared your pride in her, as our sister and friend.

Newsy, thank you for allowing us to share your life; thank you for the gift of your friendship. We will pray for you as your journey continues with God. Goodbye sister.

Coincidentally, this was the coldest day of the year, but our record attendance of friends, family and, of course, Santa Claus created a warm welcoming atmosphere.


